(Tuesday, March 19, 2013)

The Senate met at 11:21 a.m. pursuant to adjournment and was called to order by the President.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 13 ON SECOND READING

Senator Eltife moved to suspend the regular order of business to take up for consideration **SJR 13** at this time on its second reading:

SJR 13, Proposing a constitutional amendment limiting to two the number of consecutive terms for which a person may be elected or appointed to hold certain state offices.

Senator Estes offered the following amendment to the resolution:

Floor Amendment No. 1

Amend SJR 13 (senate committee report) as follows:

(1) Add the following appropriately numbered SECTION to the resolution and renumber subsequent SECTIONS accordingly:

SECTION ____. Article V, Texas Constitution, is amended by adding Section 28a to read as follows:

Sec. 28a. (a) A person who has been elected to serve two consecutive terms as the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, as a Justice of the Supreme Court, as the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, as a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, as the Chief Justice of a Court of Appeals, as a Justice of a Court of Appeals, or as a Judge of a District Court is not eligible for election to serve a third consecutive term in the same office to which the Justice or Judge was elected for two consecutive terms. This provision does not limit a person's eligibility for election to serve nonconsecutive terms.

(b) The term of a person appointed or elected to serve for the remainder of a term to fill a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice, Justice, Presiding Judge, or Judge is not counted in determining whether a person is eligible to serve under Subsection (a) of this section.

(2) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, in Subsection (a) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, line 45), between "state offices" and the period, insert "or may be elected to serve as a justice or judge of the supreme court, the court of criminal appeals, a court of appeals, or a district court in this state".

(3) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, immediately following Subsection (b) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, between lines 48 and 49), insert the following:

(c) Section 28a, Article V, of this constitution applies only to a justice or judge elected on or after January 1, 2014.

(4) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, in proposed Subsection (c) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, line 49), strike "(c)" and substitute "(d)".

(5) In SECTION 3 of the resolution, in the ballot proposition (page 1, line 58), between "railroad commissioner" and the period, insert "or may be elected to serve as a justice or judge of the supreme court, the court of criminal appeals, a court of appeals, or a district court in this state".

The amendment to SJR 13 was read.

POINT OF ORDER

Senator Eltife raised a point of order that Floor Amendment No. 1 was not germane to the body of the resolution.

POINT OF ORDER RULING

The President ruled that the point of order was well-taken and sustained.

Senator Estes offered the following amendment to the resolution:

Floor Amendment No. 2

Amend SJR 13 (senate committee report) as follows:

(1) Add the following appropriately numbered SECTION to the resolution and renumber subsequent SECTIONS accordingly:

SECTION ____. Article III, Texas Constitution, is amended by adding Section 7a to read as follows:

Sec. 7a. (a) A person who has been elected to serve two consecutive terms as a senator or two consecutive terms as a representative is not eligible for election to serve a third consecutive term. This provision does not limit a person's eligibility for election to serve nonconsecutive terms.

(b) The term of a person elected to serve for the remainder of a term to fill a vacancy in the legislature is not counted in determining whether a person is eligible to serve under Subsection (a) of this section.

(2) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, in Subsection (a) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, line 45), between "state offices" and the period, insert "or may be elected to serve as a member of the legislature".

(3) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, immediately following Subsection (b) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, between lines 48-49), insert the following:

(c) Section 7a, Article III, of this constitution applies only to a senator or a representative elected on or after September 1, 2013.

(4) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, in proposed Subsection (c) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, line 49), strike "(c)" and substitute "(d)".

(5) In SECTION 3 of the resolution, in the ballot proposition, (page 1, line 58), between "railroad commissioner" and the period, insert "or may be elected to serve as a member of the legislature".

The amendment to SJR 13 was read.

Senator Estes withdrew Floor Amendment No. 2.

SJR 13 was passed to engrossment by a viva voce vote.

SENATE BILL 160 ON SECOND READING

Amend **SB 160** (senate committee report) by striking all below the enacting clause and substituting the following:

SECTION 1. Section 33.051, Election Code, is amended by adding Subsection (f) to read as follows:

(f) On accepting a watcher for service, the election officer shall provide the watcher with a form of identification, prescribed by the secretary of state, to be displayed by the watcher during the watcher's hours of service at the polling place.

SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2013.

The amendment to SB 160 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.
